Menstrual Hygiene Drive for Syringe Exchange Clients who are Unhoused

The CPO has been collecting menstrual hygiene products to donate for the HIV Alliance Street Outreach Team to distribute to unhoused community members in Lane County. A recent CPO study, in partnership with the HIV Alliance, found that female-identified syringe exchange clients who were unhoused reported menstruation products are hard to access and greatly needed. Limited access to menstrual products increases health risks for vaginal and urinary tract infections, severe reproductive health conditions and toxic shock syndrome.

NIH Rapid Acceleration of Diagnostics For Underserved Populations (RADx-UP): Supplement Grant

Oregon Saludable: Juntos Podemos

As a supplement to the CPO, the Prevention Science Institute was awarded a grant funded by the NIH Rapid Acceleration of Diagnostics for Underserved Populations (RADx-UP) to respond to the COVID-19 pandemic by creating an intervention to promote testing in the Latinx Community in Oregon. Between February 1st 2021 and February 28th 2022, 4,146 nasal swab samples were collected for SARS-CoV-2 testing. CPO investigators are now considering innovative ways to reach Latinx parents who may struggle with opioid use to broaden the diversity of our research samples in the main CPO studies and pilots.
