Meet Our New Pilot Study Investigators



Kate Hails is a post doctoral scholar and clinical psychology resident at the Prevention Science Institute at UO. Kate is leading Pilot Study 8, An Online Parenting Intervention for Families Affected by Substance Misuse in Pediatric Primary Care. The study will test the feasibility and acceptability of a brief, app-based parenting intervention (Family Check-Up Online) delivered to parents reporting problematic substance use with children in pediatric care.



Andrea Imhof is a doctoral student in the Clinical Psychology program at UO and is researching how parent-child interactions influence child language development.

Andrea is leading Pilot Study 9, Development of the FLO Video-Coding Tool to Evaluate Responsive Caregiver-Child interactions.



Maria Schweer-Collins is a research assistant professor at UO, affiliated with the Prevention Science Institute and HEDCO Institute. Maria is leading Pilot 10, Opportunities to Interrupt Cycles of Substance Use: An Intergenerational Study of Mothers Affected by Prior Justice-
